For essay subjects and longer answer questions – suggested question titles for practice:	This is something we will be refining in the lead up to the exam, but the basic tip on longer questions is – you have been asked to describe an extract:
	1 Say where you are talking about
	2 Describe the instrument and the role (element of music)
	3 Give the impact on the music
	So, for example
	At the beginning of the extract the flute plays a triadic descending melody of B minor. This establishes the key and provides the rhythmic energy of the piece.
	Follow this advice for every point you make.
